## Telling My Fiancé About My SSA and Her Reaction

I told her about my father wounds, mother wounds, peer wounds, and how they all contributed to the sexualization of my innate normal need to connect with other men. I told her how this unmet need has manifested itself in my life since childhood, and where I stand today.

I told her about the things I am doing now to make sure my needs are met, and the significant progress I've made particularly in the last two years. I told her how I have much further to go, and that I see this as a life-long Journey. I told her about the blessings this Journey has given me -- the amazing men and women it has brought into my life, the deep consciousness and awareness I have acquired, the tools for emotional literacy I have attained, and the deep connection with G-d that I have forged.

I told her how madly in love with her I am, how beautiful she is, and how wildly attracted I am to her. I told her that I needed to have this conversation now, before we go too far down the road toward marriage, so that she can have an actual choice on this issue; I need to know that she can walk away if this is too much for her.

After listening to me pour my heart out, Arielle looked deep into my eyes, leaned over, and gave me the most passionate kiss of my life.

With tears in her eyes, she thanked for me for being so honest, vulnerable, and authentic. She told me that nothing I said scared her at all. I know the road ahead will not be without challenges. I assume I will need your support again. Knowing that I am not alone is the biggest gift anyone has ever given me.
